**IF we need to use TAGs (Teacher Assessed Grades) rather than exam due to further disruption from COVID**

JCQ – the regulator for exams, have made it clear we have to use the evidence from three assessment points over year 11, IF we need to. ***Therefore the following could be used as evidence:***

- your November mocks
- your March mocks
- in-class assessments in controlled conditions during the summer term.

# *What can you do to ensure you are in control and confident for your November mocks and beyond?*



## **Top Ten Tips!**

- 1. Engage fully in your lessons – you have eight hours a week!*
- 2. Spend your full 1 hour 45 minutes on your home learning (re-do questions if you get them wrong)*
- 3. Ask your teacher for help with anything you are not sure about*
- 4. Use the **hyper-linked revision resource (on Satchel One)** to independently revise and build confidence in all areas*
- 5. Use the DIRT activities you have completed in class to have another go at the question – how can you improve your response further?*
- 6. Create a revision timetable to incorporate productive, short sessions for all subjects.*
- 7. You know best how you retain information – use the best strategies for you and make revision materials that will help you remember information.*
- 8. Complete practice questions: ask your teacher, Mrs Winkles or Miss Baldock for these. When your confidence has improved in answering questions, get someone to time you.*
- 9. Celebrate your successes! 😊*
